Policing in America is rapidly changing right before our eyes. Use of force, qualified immunity, body cam policies, and even our discretion is all being reviewed, changed, eliminated, and overhauled. What we did as recently as April, is now considered archaic, dirty, out of touch with the communities, and unacceptable. Some of our communities are so disgusted with us, that they have chosen to get rid of us completely and "police" themselves through alternate methods. Talks of social workers combined with notions that people are only violent because the police exist, have been a driving force behind such mind boggling decisions. Our society, its leaders, and the media have chosen to believe that police have become brutal, and irresponsible with the power given them.

Stretch back in your memory to before you became a cop yourself. Now go back a little further. Go back to before you began researching academies and departments as a career option. They'll never push a car off the tracks seconds before the train arrives. They'll never pull an elderly woman out of her burning home. They'll never find the satisfaction of being a part of something as amazing as what we do every day.
